### **Off With Their Heads Part 2**

I tried my best to avoid project creep when I had the head off of the Morris, but alas I gave in. If I recall correctly the BMC A and B engines have a problem with burning the #4 exhaust valve. The theory here is the coolant does not circulate well at the back of the head. VP Steve reminded me of that theory. His solution is to leave the heater valve open a bit so water can circulate around the back of the head and then out into the heater circuit.

Well the thought of hot water circulating through the heater on a hot summer day just didn't appeal to me. With that in mind I hatched a plan. Why not plumb in a bypass so coolant could circulate out of the back of the head and return to the water pump or radiator. There is a place on the back of the head where the coolant is under pressure. Unfortunately, that port is occupied by the heater valve.

To make this work, keep the heater control valve, and not circulate coolant into the heater would be to tap the water flow after the head and before the heater valve. No problem. I just needed to modify an earlier heater valve conversion. The original used a fitting to raise the replacement heater control valve above the valve cover for clearance.

#### **More Exhaust Rattles**

A few weeks ago, I was enjoying a drive home from dinner with a friend when I noticed that the B was making a whine under acceleration. After some experimentation, I identified a pattern: it happened only when I had my foot on the accelerator, even just to maintain speed. As soon as I took my foot off, the noise stopped. I did some basic examination for issues the next day, but didn't see anything out of place. Fortunately, my phone could pick it up while driving, so I made a recording and shared it with Clay to see if he had any ideas. He came over one afternoon, and by running it on jack stands, we isolated it to the differential. There was a drop of oil hanging from the drain plug, and it appeared that the oil had gotten low over time, possibly resulting in a burnished bearing causing the noise.

After buying new outer bearing kits (and a couple of other miscellaneous parts) and making arrangements with Charlie and Clay, I headed for Magee early on a Monday morning. The brake drums put up a bit of a fight, but then Charlie's impact wrench took care of both the castle nut and the cotter pin to remove the wheel hubs. That done, the half-shafts were easy to remove, and, after pressing off the old bearings under Charlie's supervision and giving the shafts a quick cleaning, it was a quick trip back to the press to install the new bearings. Clay pointed out a burnished area on one of the old bearings, with the consensus being that it could certainly contribute to the noise. We added a touch of grease to the oil seals and a tiny bit of RTV to the bearing caps to prevent possible leaks. Reinstallation was equally painless, except for one of the hub cotter pins being a bit fiddly.

Next, we took a quick break for lunch at Berry's, then moved on to some minor jobs, or so we thought. In preparation for installing some new idle screws and doing a quick adjustment, I drove the B around town for a warm up. However, after arriving back at the workshop and installing the screws, we found that the engine would not continue to run once I cranked it. Faced with this exciting new problem, Charlie and Clay tracked it down to an electrical issue, and made a small jumper wire for the fuse block for the drive home, just in case. After some poking around under the dash, Clay was of the opinion that some of the triple connectors were of an age that made them unreliable. A little cleaning and replacement, and that problem was solved, and we could finish resetting the idle.

Finally, we did some electrical work in the radio console. While Clay was busy cleaning and replacing connectors, I had spent some time identifying wires to add a cigar lighter, which is something I've wanted to do for a while but never got around to since I don't have the correct bullet crimping tool. Clay and I completed that installation after the idle was adjusted. It's going to be great to have a phone charger in the car. We also spent some time cleaning the erratic map light switch, which is now improved but still has its moments.

Everything done, I thanked Charlie and Clay for the help, and headed home. On the drive back, the engine did not present any issues remaining running, but I was glad to have that jumper wire in case I needed it. Unfortunately, the rear axle noise followed me home, so that issue will require some more thought. I've gotten a couple of recommendations to try Lucas gear oil, so that's likely my next course of action.

# AND MORE Exhaust Rattles By Tom Brown



After five days of spirited drives in Arkansas, at the end of each day I had the same comment, "I need 20 more HP and better brakes." Shortly thereafter, I received an email from Charlie Durning. The email contained drawings and a parts list to install disc brakes on the rear of my MGB. The plans consisted of fabricating two brackets per wheel and a list of parts needed. I won't itemize a complete list, but I used Honda rotors and Nissan 240 SX calipers. I made the brackets out of 3/8" 6061 T6 aluminum. The drawings were very easy to follow. The brake hoses and fittings were no problem to find on the internet (Amazon/Ebay). I had to shorten the brake line from the tee on the axle tube to the left side caliper. I practiced double flaring on the cutoff section, until I felt confident to go for it.

The park brake cables had to be shortened. I shortened them and got the ferrule from Revelle Hardware. The park brake levers needed to be lengthened just a bit, and a 1/4" hole drilled for the clevis pin. I already had 5/16" spacers for the mag wheels on the car, so clearance was no problem.

I went for a test drive and the pedal felt a little spongy, I didn't know if I needed to bleed a little more or if I needed the 2 lb residual check valve. I opted to put the check valves on anyway, which became another test on double flaring. The second road test was excellent.

The total cost was around \$250. I feel it was well worth it. If anyone would like help or tips, give me a call.

I'll work on the 20 extra HP later'


