The caliper is too big to pass back through the opening, so the only thing to do is disconnect the brake hose. 


NAMGBR 2022

BROWN SUGAR & BACON PUFF TWISTS

INGREDIENTS

1/4 cup packed light brown sugar

1/2 of a 17.3-ounce package Pepperidge Farm® Puff Pastry Sheets(1 sheet), thawed

9 slices uncooked bacon

3 tablespoons grated or shredded Parmesan cheese

1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper



DIRECTIONS

- 1. Heat the oven to 400°F. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper.
- 2. Sprinkle **half** the brown sugar on the work surface. Unfold the pastry sheet on the work surface. Sprinkle the pastry with the remaining brown sugar. Roll the pastry sheet into a 14x10-inch rectangle. Cut the pastry sheet in half lengthwise. Cut each half crosswise into 18 (3/4-inch wide) strips, making 36.
- **3.** Cut the bacon slices in half lengthwise, then crosswise, making 36 (about 5x1/2-inch) strips.
- **4.** Place 1 bacon strip on each pastry strip. Twist the pastry and bacon together and place on the baking sheets, pressing down the ends. Stir the cheese and cayenne pepper in a small bowl. Sprinkle the pastries with the cheese mixture.
- **5.** Bake for 15 minutes or until the pastries are golden brown and the bacon is crisp. Let the pastries cool on the baking sheets on wire racks for 5 minutes.
- **6.** Ingredient Note: Bacon varies in size from brand to brand. Depending the brand you use, you may have some leftover pieces after cutting the strips needed for this recipe.
- **7.** Recipe Note: Parchment paper keeps the pastry from sticking to the baking sheet and also makes for easier cleanup. If you don't have parchment paper, you can spray the baking sheet with cooking spray instead. However, cooking spray may cause the bottoms of the pastries to brown more quickly, so begin checking for doneness 5 minutes early.
- **8.** *Make-Ahead:* To make ahead, cover and freeze the unbaked pastries on the baking sheets until firm. Remove the pastries from the baking sheets and store in a gallon-size resealable plastic bag in the freezer for up to 1 month. To bake, place the pastries onto baking sheets and bake as directed above.
- 9. Flavor Variation: For Cheddar & Rosemary Puff Twists, substitute shredded Cheddar cheese for the brown sugar and minced fresh rosemary for the cayenne pepper.

Autopsy of a Noisy 1098 Part 3: Trials and Tribulations

After some delays and forgotten parts, all of the parts needed have finally arrived.. The adventure will be test fitting available parts that are not originally for a 1098 engine. In the end, there will be some much needed improvements. The 1098 engine is the "middle child" of the A Series engines. Some features are leftover features from the 848 and 948 "small block" engines, and some of the 1098 features were adopted by the 1275 "big block engine". And the A+ engines share features from all of the A Series engines and have some of their own unique features. It will take a mix of parts from all of the engine series to get the step-child 1098 back on the road.

The good part is the parts unique to the 1098 engine installed without incident. The pistons had a good fit at .003" clearance, the rings had a .013" gap, and the main and rod bearings came in at .0015" clearance. All are within spec for the engine. That was the easy part. The new lock tabs for the main cap bolts did not fit. Those were easily modified by drilling the holes to size and trimming the excess material.

The next challenge is with the camshaft. The original cam has what is called a pin drive for the oil pump. Unfortunately, nobody offers a pin drive camshaft anymore. That means the oil pump has to be changed to a slot drive to mate with the new camshaft. That would be just fine, except there are at least 5 different oil pumps for the A Series engines and on top of that there are variables with the oil pump drive shafts. In addition some pumps use 2, 3, or 4 bolts to mount to the engine block. The 1098 engine uses 3 bolts. After some head scratching, I came up with an oil pump for a 998 A+ engine. An order was placed.





Though the oil pump is physically different, the pump casting had provisions for mounting with 2, 3, or 4 bolts, the pump received was drilled for 3 bolts. The new oil pump bolted right up, sort of. It was then it was discovered that the bolts for the new oil pump need to be ¼" shorter than the original bolts. A stack of washers would not be an acceptable solution. Order for the special bolts was placed and the new pump was installed without incident.

To mount the engine on the engine stand, the engine back plate must first be installed. No problem. The new gasket was slathered with gasket sealer and attached to the back plate. A little trimming of the gasket needed to be done around the tin can oil pump cover. That should have been a sign. Sure enough, the back plate would not fit over the new oil pump. Rats!! In the infinite wisdom of BMC, they apparently didn't confirm that the hole in the back plate would align with the oil pump pocket in the back of the block. The alignment was off by around ¼". As near as I can tell, BMC never rectified that fault for the 1098 engine. After doing some research and calling in some favors, a solution was found. Grind down the offending ears on the oil pump. Now the back plate fits but the back plate gasket was spoiled. Replacement gasket ordered.

While the engine is out and the head is off I decided to convert the head for the A+ water pump. Fortunately, the A+ water pump conversion went smoothly, sort of. To make this work a tube for the bypass hose must be removed from the head and a blocking plug installed. No problem, just order the plug. Rover does make a plug for the purpose of blocking the hole in the head. For some reason unknown to modern man, the plug has a thread size and pitch of 5/8-16. That's right, not a typo. The correct plug does have a part number, but nobody stocks that plug. For some reason the usual suppliers only stock a plug with 5/8-18 thread. That is just too Rube Goldberg for me.





I hatched an evil plan. I'll just plug the existing fitting. First the fitting must be removed from the head. Sounds easy. Well the fitting was very stubborn. The way to remove stuck fittings is with fire. The torch did its job and the fitting was removed. With the fitting out of the head I was able to whack off the tube and then braze in a plug. That solved that problem and one source of a water leak is now abated. Hopefully the rest of the engine overhaul will go smoothly. More on that later.

Tomato Cocktail

Veal & Ham Pie

Lettuce & Cucumber Salad

Glacé Grapes

Tomato Cocktail Add to a cup of strained tomato juice a teaspoonful of finely chopped onion. Press through a fine sieve and mix with a tablespoonful of lemon juice, a tablespoonful of wine vinegar, a teaspoonful of finely chopped celery or half a teaspoonful of celery seed; half a small bay leaf and a level tablespoonful of sugar. Let it stand two hours in a cool place, then strain and put in the refrigerator.

Veal & Ham Pie Cut into small pieces a pound of lean veal from which all the skin has been removed, a quarter of a pound of lean ham and bacon, cutting it into neat strips. Mix together with some finely chopped parsley, pepper and salt and the thinly grated rind of half a lemon and a little water. Arrange in the dish with slices of hard-boiled egg and cover with parsley. When the pie is baked, heat some good jelly stock and pour it through the hole at the top of the pie with a funnel. Leave it to get cold. For the pastry, see the chicken pie recipe in Menu No. 1.

Lettuce & Cucumber Pie Wash the lettuce and leave it in a wire basket to drain. Then dry it further by wrapping it in a clean towel and patting it. Take off the outer leaves and use the inner ones, breaking them with the fingers. Arrange them in a salad bowl. Slice part of a cucumber after peeling it very thinly, and mix it with the lettuce. Then add a few chopped gherkins and dress the salad with oil and vinegar, pepper and salt.

Glacé Grapes Put two teacupfuls of white sugar into an enamel saucepan with a cup of boiling water and half a teaspoonful of cream of tartar. Heat to boiling water. Boil without stirring until syrup begins to discolour, which is 310 degrees F. Wash off the sugar that adheres to the sides of the pan. Remove the saucepan from the fire and place in a larger pan of cold water to instantly stop boiling. Take the grapes in small clusters from the bunch and dip in the syrup and remove to oiled paper.

still grungy from the road trip so it needed a full detail and wax job.



TOOL TECH TIP: EASY VALVE ADJUSTER

Adjusting valves can be frustrating at times. Our little cars have a slit for a flat blade screwdriver and a very thin lock nut. Something had to be done to keep the screwdriver from slipping out of place and something to keep the wrench from slipping off of the lock nut. The solution is slip a piece of tubing over the end of the screwdriver. That will keep the screwdriver from slipping off of the adjuster. The other tip is to grind down the side of the box end wrench to eliminate the taper. That will give a better grip and can prevent the wrench from slipping off of the lock nut.
