
12th Annual VTR Southeast Regional Convention

A full selection of events is planned including ralleys, autocross, driving tours, concours, and more.


It sounds like great time and a chance to do something alittle different. Does anyone from the club want to go?





Then the group journeyed to picturesque Oakley Plantation for a tour of the antebellum home, followed by lunch at not-too-historic, but plenty-fun Steamboat Charlie's Sports Bar and Grill. From there the group disbanded, with members motoring back to their respective domiciles.

John and Florence Simmers did an outstanding job arranging this historic and educational event, driving the entire course previously to ensure a smooth journey for their fellow members.
