Harvey Wimbleton - practical joking technician who was fired from Duckham's after putting laundry detergent in their 40-weight oil being delivered to Triumph. He then went to a major U.S. pharmaceutical firm and was fired for putting Crazy Glue in their Preparation H.

Oscar Pippenholt - ex-Tinkertoy engineer credited with the design of the TR-2/3 top frame.

Yorick Bayden-Duntov - Leader of the Chealsea Rust Strippers Union who pressured Triumph to use corrosive Crimson brake fluid after silicon fluid became available.

Elliot McTavish - wire wheel tuning specialist at Dunlop since 1935 who retired in 1973 when it was discovered that he had been tone-deaf since WW 11.

Installing Glass

Having trouble installing a windshield or glass lens in a rubber gasket? Work in a length of heavy twine with a screw driver along the channel first, then press the glass against the gasket. Pulling the twine will pull the lip over the glass neatly and quickly.
