

We are not covered by a group or club policy and in the event of any unfortunate injury to a participant and/or spectator, we could have a problem. We have linked the previous Empire Trophy Rallys to the SCCA, and our last two British car shows have been linked to the Highland Games. We must now consider liability as well as publicity as part of any planning process. I hope one of the legally inclined members will provide the appropriate advice on the liability question (and waive his/her fee).

Sidney spent a long time in the shop compounded by the fact that Lamar suffered a heart attack and Sidney was placed even farther back on the burner, and the heat was turned down lower. Parts we had located were lost and had to be reordered or scrounged. Finally, it emerged from the shop with a really good paint job and, like some of us, looked pretty good from fifteen feet away.

During this time we tried a local upholsterer for the interior. After some time he gave it up as being beyond his skills. Then Pat loaded Sidney on the trailer and headed for Gary Miller's shop in Yazoo City.

Once again, because of money, the car wasn't a high priority, but after a while Pat brought the car home finished and ready for the road. It was a day or so before our thirteenth anniversary, and I accepted the car with great pride as a gift of love from "the man I would most like to be parked next to in the garage of life". That was June of last year. Since then the car has been my true pride and joy. I love it because it's cute and small and is fun to drive, even though I have my share of problems with it, living in a very hilly town. I have to pick my routes as I can't manage a stop on a steep hill without rolling backwards. Just recently on a Sunday drive I had to cut the engine and turn it over to Pat when a car got too close on my tail and I found myself unable to get moving after a stop on a hill.


Be Warned:

On close examination, upon which I damaged (frightfully) a knee of my best tweed trousers, I found a great, long, beastly, pipe-thing had dropped from some where and was, in fact dragging upon the road. Now Mr. Spanner, Sir, I would like to know just exactly what this thing is that has spoiled my motoring, and how I may repair it myself here at the manor.

Mr. Chomondeley's problem is not all that difficult for the trained shade tree mechanic.
