British Car Day 1984

Egad! Successs!

CMC-VTR finally put together a winning combination of dry weather (but blistering) and good preparation to pull off a successful British Car Day on July 7 in Jackson. Compare 27 registered contestants and prehaps 45 or 50 British cars on display with a total of 5 cars at our 1983 event!

The car show drew not only heavy participation from CMC-VTR but also attracted contingents from the British Sports Car Club of Memphis and The Louisiana Centre of the MG Car Club. Many spectators passed through during the day, including a TV crew from Channel 12 which aired a nice report on the event on Sunday and Monday. The TV crew added a few awards of their own, designating the Speetjens 100-4 as "Happiest British Car" and the Peel TR-2 as "Most Frightened British Car".

Aside from the good fellowship and viewing of the cars, some of the contestants tried their hands at the "What Is It Board" contest (Dick Kingsafer of Natchez said that they were all marital aids) and the British Automotive Trivia Contest. Prehaps one of the most popular activities, however, was walking over to the Agricultural Museum next door to cool off and have a cold Coke!

In addition to high temperatures, the event saw Best Restored MG:

several interesting and unusual cars arrive. Thom Anderson of Memphis arrived in a beautifully restored two-seater Austin Healey 3000 BN-7 which was one of only 350 built. Frank Peel's TR-2 was towed in and would have won the "Least Likely to Make It Home" award had it not been for the rule that the vehicle arrive under its own power. Dan Sheppard of Memphis brought his 1965 Triumph Herald convertible which was a very impressive car. A Rolls Royce also arrived for a short while, but its occupants never left its air-conditioned confines and wet bar.


Joe & John Weston renewed their membership from last year. They own a TR-3A and live at

Real Triumph owners don't use iron filings for magnafluxing. They snort them instead!

OK. You've checked your timing and it's spot-You've tried tuning your carburettors to no result. Compression checks out so the valves and the head gasket are OK. You can find no problem with the carburettor mechanically. Even the valve timing and clearances check out. What next? outstanding magazine The Vintage Triumph and

You've got air leaking into the system somewhere. To check for air leakage, get out your propane torch and start your engine and let it idle. Open up the valve on your torch but don't light it. Pass the torch around the intake manifold gaskets and the carburettors, paying particular attention to where the throttle shafts pass through the carburettor body. If you have a leak at any of these points, your rpm's will rise.

One of the most common points of leakage on older cars is where the throttle shafts pass through your carb's - you will probably be able to rattle them in the oval-shaped groove they have formed. Air leaking into the system here bypasses contact one of the officers listed below: the jets thereby giving you "untunable" carb's. These shafts may be replaced by oversized shafts and fitted to your carb using valve grinding compound and an old shaft. Even better, obtain a throttle shaft bush kit and new shafts and install them using a drill press (be careful!). Either of these methods takes skill.

Other ills can be cured by replacing manifold gaskets. Make sure that you have good, even surfaces that match between the manifolds and your head - if you don't, take your parts to a good machinist to have them shaved.

I once found a hole the size of my thumb on the underside of my intake manifold. Try tuning your carb's with that problem!
