

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British Car Fest

Six members of CMC-VTR were recently treated to one heck of a fine car show in Memphis, Tennessee!

The British Sports Car Club of Memphis held their first annual British Car Fest on Mud Island October 26 through 28. Buffing, repairing, ogling, and car talk was the order of the day as participants and the public alike admired the 95 British cars on display that Saturday. Attending from Jackson were CMC-VTR members Mike and Bitsy Hemsley, Frank and Tricia Peel in their TR-6, and Alex and Tere Wade in their TR-3. Also attending from Natchez were Dick and Louan Kingsafer and Jack Pool in his Austin Healey 3000.

Eighteen Triumphs made the event with many TR-6's, TR-3's and even a fully race-prepped TR-4 attending. Healeys, MG's, and Jaguars were, of course, everywhere.

Several rare types also showed, including a 1929 MG M-Type, a very early AC Cobra 260, an MGA Mk. II Coupe, an Austin Healey 3000 Mk. II two seater, and an alloy-bodied Aston Martin DB II with a Gran Prix engine (only 3 of these engines

were ever made - two plugs per cylinder!). The owner of the Aston Martin turned out to be a very interesting fellow; he had to leave his Maserati and Jaguar C-Type at home!

The event had tremendous sponsorship; there must have been over twenty sponsors who donated door prizes. Given away, in fact, was a new set of Pirelli tires and a Betamax VCR (won by the Peel's)!
