Yes, a lot of vintage car owners visit Mississippi on a regular basis, but on Monday October 4th, a very special and unusual group of motorists arrived: members of the Jaguar Enthusiasts' Club of England, driving their own cars!

The Club sent some 59 of their cars via container ship from the Mother Country to Texas, and they are beginning a "Deep South U.S. Tour" which began in Galveston and will conclude in Charleston, South Carolina. The oldest car in the group is a 7-horsepower, 40-mile-per-hour-top-speed 1929 Austin Swallow (the Swallow company being the forerunner of Jaguar) with the newest being an XK 8. Most are 1950s, 1960s vintage. Several XK 140s/150s and 3.4 and 3.8 saloons, plus a gaggle of E-Types. A nice assortment. They also have a 60th vehicle in the procession: a lorry/truck loaded with extra parts and driven by Jaguar mechanics.

They motored into Natchez Monday afternoon, and that evening, Cappy and Judy Stahlman and Merideth and I served as "official" greeters (selected by the Chamber of Commerce) to welcome them at a champagne reception at the antebellum mansion "Dunleith."

They left Natchez Tuesday morning for the Vicksburg National Military Park where they were greeted by Pat Cashman, who pointed out sites of interest. Then, this afternoon, the group left Mississippi for Memphis, where they plan to party on Beale Street and tour Graceland.
