I've been working on my MG brake upgrade that Charlie Durning designed. It converts the front stock brakes to vented rotors for cooler operation and less brake fade using Nissan calipers and Toyota rotors. These valves keep pressure on the caliper and shorten pedal travel. We were honored by having Will and Jennifer Duncan show up for moral support and general camaraderie.
