FUN & GAMES WITH A LOTUS EUROPA OR HOW THE LUCAS GODS ALWAYS WIN! PART 1

It seems that one of my yearly projects is to replace the speedometer cable on my Europa TC. The cable is over 82" inches long and snakes from the rear transmission to the speedometer in the dash. Under the dash is a 90 degree bend and ends with a 45 degree bend at the transmission. The speedometer has never been smooth and jerks around like a deranged hummingbird. It seems that each year the inner cable breaks due to these bends and has to be replaced. The cost of the complete cable (inner and outer) is over \$100 and to me is unreasonable for only getting a year out it and what little I drive the TC. So, this year I decided to replace the manual speedometer with a GPS driven model. Since the manual speedometer only has one electrical connection (The backlight) it seemed like a pretty standard (easy) job to replace.

I found a GPS speedometer that was almost the same diameter and look pretty decent with a step motor speed dial (Not a digital readout) and ordered it from China. Not sure what to expect and a long wait I was surprised how fast it arrived, and it looked really decent.

It did have a digital readout for the mileage and trip odometer It also had a left and right turn signal indicators and a high beam indicator light. Now my Europa is a TC and not a TC Special. For this project, the main difference between the two is that the TC Special has a left and right indicator light and the TC uses only one indicator light for both the left and right turn indicators. On the TC between the tachometer and the odometer there are three lights, a blue one (high beam indicator), a red one (ignition light) and a green one (for either left or right turn indicator).

THE ENGINE GOES BACK WHERE IT BELONGS

Now that the short block is assembled it's time to work on getting the engine mounted in the car. Back when I removed the engine, I discovered that the transmission cross member is held in with 8 bolts. 2 of those bolts would require the removal of the master cylinder. Master cylinder removal in a Morris Minor is a hate-

ful job requiring many 4 letter words.



Not wanting to go there, I took a second look at what I had. HMMM, the oil pan is off and the head is off, this just might work. I was able to sneak the engine out and didn't even have to remove the cross member or the bonnet. Since that worked I'm sure the reverse procedure would work also.

The problem here is the engine and trans can be inserted easy enough by tilting

the engine so the pan clears the front cross member, but that places the rear of the transmission under the transmission cross member. The other obstacle is the steering rack rests directly over the engine bell housing and the front cross member does not allow the engine any forward movement.

The decision was made to attach the transmission to the bare short block and sneak the transmission and short block in as a unit. That way the front of the engine could be lowered enough to just clear the front cross member, clear the steer-

ing rack, and still have enough room to maneuver the rear of the transmission over the transmission cross member.

Before all of that can happen, the flywheel and clutch have to be installed. No problem. In order to get the clutch installed I would need a clutch alignment tool. After digging around I found my universal alignment tool. Unfortunately the kit wasn't universal enough. I need a pilot that is 1/2" in diameter. The smallest in the kit was 9/16". Since all but the 9/16"



pilots show considerable use I felt it was safe to modify the 9/16" pilot since it showed no prior use.

A trip to my buddy Joe's place to use his lathe was now in order. Joe does live an hour away, but at least I can use his lathe for FREE. The modification took about 5 minutes and I was back on the road to my shop.

Once the clutch was installed, the transmission could be attached. Though the Morris transmission is small and light weight it is a bit awk-




ward to handle precisely. Basically it takes at least 3 hands to insert the transmission into the clutch splines, support it so it does not damage the clutch disc, and start a couple of attaching bolts. All at the same time. The solution is to make a couple of long alignment dowels. The dowels were made by cutting the heads off of a couple of long 5/16" bolts and then slotting the ends to make removal easier. That way the process of attaching the transmission could be accomplished with just 2 hands. Bingo, it worked.

The next day Pres John and Bro Clay decided to show up and heckle. But their plan failed and were put to work. Bro Clay was tasked with getting the transmission mounted to the cross member and Pres John tackled the front engine mounts. While they were busy I tackled getting the oil pick up and oil pan ready to go back on the engine. Once the assigned tasks were done Bro Clay and Pres John abandoned ship, leaving me to finish the assembly on another day.

Mulligatawaney Soup

Cold Ham & Potato Salad

Cream Cheese & Celery Biscuit

Mulligatawney Soup: Cut an onion in rings and an ounce of ham into dice. Put an ounce of butter in a frying pan and fry the onion and ham in it until golden brown, then add one turnip cut in small pieces, part of a carrot sliced and a small apple sliced, and after that a teaspoonful of good curry powder and half a teaspoon of curry paste and a quart of stock. Leave them to simmer for an hour, then strain through a hair sieve. Put back into the pan and add a tablespoonful of flour mixed with a little cold water and stir till the soup boils and thickens.

Potato Salad: Choose small waxy potatoes and boil a pound in their skins. When sufficiently cooked cut them into slices while warm. Put into a bowl and cover with olive oil and a glass of white wine; add salt and pepper and seasoning and sprinkle with finely chopped parsley and shallot.


TR6s at Shoals
